MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD AT THE 'CAMDEN HEAD', ISLINGTON, LONDON, ON THURSDAY 19th SEPTEMBER 1996, COMMENCING AT 2.00pm.

MEMBERS PRESENT

John Inglefield-Watson (Chairman), Jim Catterall, Alan Drysdall Dennis Firth, Aubrey Glassborow, David Hardwick, Alan MacGregor and David Wall.

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Tony Chilton, Dave Matthews, Peter van der Molen and Brian Trotter.

DAVID FINLAY

The Chairman announced the death of David Finlay, and members stood in his remembrance.

1. MINUTES OF THE LAST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

It was proposed by Aubrey and seconded by David Hardwick that these be signed as a correct record. There were no matters arising.

2. SECRETARY'S REPORT

David Wall reported that membership remains fairly stable, there were 43 members in South Africa and 37 in the United Kingdom. Regarding the membership survey, 23 replies had so far been received from U.K. members. Preferences for meetings were 1st choice midweek during Stampex, and 2nd choice Saturdays not during Stampex.

3. TREASURER'S REPORT

David Hardwick was pleased to report another good year for the Society. Income increased by nearly £140.00 thanks to auction commission of £80.00, an increase in subscription income and the subvention transfer from South Africa. Although expenditure increased by £70.00, this was due to the cost of printing and distributing the Typology (£123.00). The normal Society expenses were reduced by more than £50.00 thanks to a reduction in the cost of distributing Runner Post following suggestions at the last AGM to use printed paper rates and by purchasing mint stamps at a discount from a well known stamp dealer. I would like to thank on behalf of the Society the owner of the printing equipment who allows us to produce Runner Post and only charges for materials at cost, thus saving the Society at least £200.00 per year, and also my fellow Committee members who claim only a small percentage (or none at all) of the costs they incur in serving the Society. Finally I would also like to personally thank Aubrey for the auditing of the accounts. The Committee had proposed that advertising income from Runner Post should be split on a 50/50 basis between the U.K. and South Africa. The adoption of the accounts was proposed by Alan Drysdall and seconded by Jim Catterall. There was a proposal from the Chair that Aubrey Glassborow be re-elected as Auditor. Betty George had paid her current year's subscription, but she does not wish to continue membership after the current year now that Mike's collection has been sold.

4. SUBSCRIPTIONS 1997-1998

It was agreed that subscriptions remain unchanged, proposed David Hardwick, seconded Alan MacGregor.

5. EDITOR'S REPORT

Alan MacGregor apologised for the lateness of recent issues of Runner Post, due to having other commitments. There is need of a correspondent from Botswana to provide up to date information.

6. AUCTIONEER'S REPORT

A list of lots for the next auction will probably be sent out with the December Runner Post.

7. QUERIES TO THE ARCHIVIST

Aubrey asked what publications are held by the Archivist. Other queries related to the location of the Society's copy of Holmes's book, and who has the medal for Runner Post.

8. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

John stated that following custom, he did not give a mid-term report last year, so this report covers the two years since he was re-elected. No sooner was the period under way than we were greatly saddened by the sudden death of Mike George. I would like to re-iterate my thanks to the other officers who rallied round and helped the Society to keep afloat during a difficult few months. Fortunately David Wall came home from Botswana and took over the helm and we weathered the storm. With David Wall at the helm and David Hardwick in the engine room (or should I say on the footplate) I am confident that the Society's administration is 'steady as she goes'.

Throughout the period the high standard of Runner Post that we have come to expect, has been maintained. I feel sure that I speak for all members of the Society in expressing our gratitude to the Editor, Alan MacGregor. My two previous reports contained several expressions of gloom and doom, but after four years of frustration on several fronts, my own visions for our future have met with their first success during my final term of office, publication of the Postal Markings Typology. I am delighted to announce that the Society has been awarded a bronze-silver medal for this publication in the Literature class at the current Stampex. I have already sent a personal letter of congratulation to the author, Brian Trotter, and will return to this matter at the end of my report. The Typology is, I hope, the forerunner of two more related volumes covering updated versions of the published articles about the Postal Markings of the Bechuanalands and of Botswana respectively. However no progress can be made until Brian Trotter, the project leader, feels able to resume activity following his move to Indonesia.

Meanwhile the Society has co-operated with Ted Proud in preparation of his 'Postal History of Basutoland and Bechuanaland Protectorate', which was advertised in the last Runner Post. Progress in being made with another Society publication, a comprehensive numbered check list (with illustrations) of the 'Postal Stationery of the Bechuanalands and Botswana', being compiled by Peter Thy and myself. The first of three articles appealing for information on specific aspects of the listing, appears in Runner Post No.43. Please make the effort to see whether you can answer any of our questions and respond accordingly.

When re-elected two years ago, I stated firmly that I would not stand again. Now having passed my 70th birthday, the time has come for me to hand over the reins. Having reported on the highlights of my final term, I would in conclusion like to take a brief glimpse into the future. My personal support for the Society will remain as enthusiastic as before. I will be willing, if members so wish, to serve in some lesser capacity, and will certainly be happy to continue to receive and to try and answer members' philatelic queries. For the Society as a whole, I am in no doubt that if it is to remain in good health, the over-riding priority must be to identify members, existing or yet to be recruited, who may be able to play a part in the administration of the Society. At present I can think of no potential replacements for our key officers. Repeated efforts and experiments to attract new faces to our meetings have met with little or no success and are probably a 'dead duck'. However in spite of the inadequate support when suggested a few years ago, I still believe that the concept of occasional (biennial) residential weekend meetings might pay dividends, but that will not be for me to decide. The methods may not be evident, but the guiding principle must be recruitment. My thanks and best wishes to all members world-wide.

Proposal from the Chair. That a letter of congratulation be sent to Brian Trotter in respect of the award to the Society, of a bronze-silver medal for the 'Postal Markings Typology', and that the Society presents the medal to him, while retaining the accompanying certificate in the Society's archives. All present at the meeting were in favour.

9. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE SOCIETY RULES

<u>Rule 6.</u> Vice-Chairman to be added to the list of Officers of the Society. The wording at the end to read "However, after serving the maximum period, the ex-Chairman <u>be elected</u> (amended to becomes eligible proposed David Hardwick, seconded Aubrey Glassborow) to serve on the Committee in any other capacity"

<u>Rule 7.</u> This to be amended to "The Chairman, or in his/her absence the Vice-Chairman, shall conduct the meetings, but in the event of both being absent the Committee shall elect one of its number to take the Chair. The Chairman of the Meeting shall have a second or casting vote where this is necessary"

Rule 13. The words "A Librarian" will be replaced by "An Archivist".

10. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Chairman - Alan MacGregor, proposed John Inglefield-Watson, seconded David Hardwick. Vice-Chairman - John Inglefield-Watson, proposed Alan MacGregor, seconded Jim Catterall. Secretary - David Wall,

proposed John Inglefield-Watson, seconded Aubrey Glassborow. The other Officers and Members of the Committee were re-elected en-bloc.

11. RE-ELECTION OF AUDITOR

The re-election of Aubrey Glassborow was proposed by John Inglefield-Watson and seconded by David Hardwick.

12. FUTURE MEETINGS

This was proposed for Friday 7th March 1997, during the Chris Rainey / Trevor Davis London Stamp and Postal History Fair, being held at one of the Royal Horticultural Halls. The Autumn meeting will be on Thursday 18th September 1997.

13. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Midpex '97. Six frames will be available which will hold 96 sheets. David Hardwick and David Wall will organise. A notice will be placed in Runner Post.

A suggestion had been made by the Committee that we have an eight page handout for exhibitions, containing extracts from Runner Post, and including an application form.

Pacific '97. Alan Drysdall queried whether we have been approached to provide an article for the magazine 'Forerunners'.

DISPLAY

David Hardwick provided a display of material from the Cape to Bulawayo section of his Cape to Cairo Railway collection.

He had made a fortunate purchase of 70,000 Rhodesia Railways parcels stamps, and a selection of these were shown unused and on waybills.

Also included were a map of the route of the railway, a postcard of Cecil Rhodes's funeral train, railway advertising envelopes, postcards, photographs and menus, South African Railways correspondence, a cover cancelled Shipping Postmaster, Cape Town, postcards of Cape Town railway station, a poster and photograph relating to the Rhodesia and Nyasaland Railway Mission.

There were Passenger's Luggage tickets from Mafeking, and a piece with the station cancellation, railway cancellations on pieces, station cancellations of Lobatsi, Ootsi, Ramoutsa and Palla Road, covers and pieces from Mahalapye, Palapye, Serule, Macloutsi, Shashi, Francestown, Tssessebe and Plumtree, and Imperial Press Conference and Royal Visit covers.

Also on show were maps, timetables, booklets relating to travel and railways in Southern Africa and items relating to Cecil Rhodes. A splendid assortment of material. Many thanks David.

RESULTS OF 1996 SURVEY OF UK-BASED MEMBERS

Earlier this year a questionnaire was sent out to all UK-based members. The main purpose of the survey was to establish if there was any way that more members could be attracted to meetings: when should meetings be held to maximise attendance? what sort of attractions would members like to see? and so on...

33 questionnaires were sent out and eventually 23 returned.

The main features of the results were as follows:

The 23 respondents were neatly divided according to frequency of attendance into 8 'regular', 7 'occasional' and 8 'never'.

Preferred frequency of meetings

Of the 16 who expressed an opinion, 10 preferred twice-yearly meetings, 5 annual and 1 quarterly. So the twice-yearly meetings we hold seem to be the preferred frequency.

Likelihood of attending by timing of meeting

For each of a range of options of meeting times, members were asked how likely their attendance would be. Scoring 3 for 'would very probably attend'; down to 0 for 'would not attend' - the most preferred options were:

Midweek during STAMPEX	1.81
Saturday not during STAMPEX	1.53
Midweek not during STAMPEX	1.33

So midweek during STAMPEX is the most popular time for meetings, followed by Saturday meetings <u>not</u> during STAMPEX. However, the meeting last March was one such Saturday not during STAMPEX, and the attendance was poor - so midweek meetings during STAMPEX (or other exhibition of similar appeal) it shall be

Since one of the aims of the survey was to canvass the views of those who do not attend meetings regularly, the scores for those who only 'occasionally' or 'never' attend were calculated separately. As expected, these showed less overall likelihood of attendance than for the regulars; however, midweek during STAMPEX was still the most preferred option with a score of 1.22.

More or less business?

- · nobody expressed a desire for more business
- of the eight 'regulars': two wanted less business

four wanted <u>no</u> business (except at AGM) two expressed no opinion (happy the way it is?)

Alternative attractions

The suggested alternative attractions received the following support:

visiting speakers	17
auction	17
bourse	16
workshop	8

One member-dealer warned that, for a bourse to succeed, we would need to guarantee attendance of about 20 members in order to tempt dealers to bring their stock. In any case, since meetings will be timed to coincide with a major exhibition, members will have ample opportunity to browse through dealers' stock at the exhibition itself.

There are many eminent speakers who could be invited to talk on topics relating to the stamps, postal history or more general history of the Bechuanalands. But again, if we can guarantee the attendance of only eight members would potential speakers be willing to make the effort? One approach might be to invite a speaker to address a combined meeting with another society. I shall investigate this further.

Auctions are a possibility, though Tony Chilton has enough trouble accumulating material for an occasional postal auction. Moreover, one of our key members threatens not to attend meetings if an auction is the only attraction!

Which brings us back to displays from members themselves. Response to the 'willingness to display' question was rather poor. I hope members did not think that when I referred to a 'full display' I meant a standard exhibition display of 120 sheets! The size of displays at meetings is generally much more modest. Whilst the 'Runner Post' is clearly the lifeblood of the society, it is still important that some form of attraction is laid on at the twice-yearly meetings.

Many thanks to those who took the time to complete and return the questionnaire.

MEMBERS' COMMENTS AND QUERIES

MYSTERY STELLALAND MARKING

Joe Taylor writes to enquire if any member can shed any light on an apparent cancellation on a Stellaland 1d postage stamp (SG 1). The stamp is cancelled vertically by a violet crayon mark similar to those seen on some covers. Alan Drysdall' article 'Stellaland Revisited' in RP 23, illustrates a cover bearing a pair of 1d stamps cancelled with a vertical 'line drawn in coloured crayon' (p422, Figure 5).

The stamp also shows part of what appears to be an octagonal cachet which reads at top left "ASSISTA. . ." And at bottom left "Bech(uanaland)" and in the middle "No._____" underneath which is "Date"

Joe asks if any member recognises this marking and could explain why it appears on a postage stamp. Can there be any connection to the Warren Expedition?



The letters 'Assist...' are presumably the first part of the word 'Assistant' which on fiscal cancellations would read 'Assistant Resident Commissioner'. The style of the lettering is also very similar to some of the fiscal cancellations. However those cancellations are invariably oval in shape. Any suggestions?


ALTERATION

SG 53a 353c 1889 4d on ½d vermilion (surcharge inverted) has been renumbered from SG 53a to SG 53c. This stamp remains priced at £3750.

In the Preface to the SG Catalogue, the Editor acknowledges "A number of very scarce stamp booklets varieties have been added, as have a number of other modern items, with the help of Mr. R. Andersson."

1889 (AUG.) "FOURPENCE" SURCHARGE VARIETIES

The four B.P. additions to the SG Catalogue (SG 53a, 53b, 53cb and 55c) were illustrated as part of an article by N. West in RP 32 (p657). All four were offered for sale by auction at Christie's Robson Lowe's London sale on 19 November 1996. They formed part of the "Jeffrey K. Weiss FRPS,L collection of the British Empire issues founded on the Great Britain 1887 Queen Victoria Jubilee issue". They were described as follows:

75	A single used on small piece showing "Fou", variety "rpence" omitted, fine. Extremely rare, at most three exist, all used. R.P.S. Certificate (1989). S.G. 53a.	£7,000-9,000
7 6	A lower left comer block of six $(3x2)$, the centre top stamp showing "F", variety "ourpence" omitted; the top row with light horizontal crease, otherwise fine mint. Extremely rare, possibly a single also exists. R.P.S. Certificate (1989). S.G. 53b.	£15,000-20,000
78	A single showing surcharge inverted and "ourpence" omitted, clearly cancelled by part barred numeral; minor perf faults at top otherwise fine. Unique. R.P.S. Certificate (1989). S.G. 53cb.	£8,000-10,000
88	A single showing varieties overprint double and error "Protectorrte", fine unused with large part original gum. Unique. R.P.S. Certificate (1989). S.G. 55c.	£10,000-12,000

The estimates proved somewhat optimistic as only lot 88 of these four items sold. It fetched £10,295 (£9500 + 15% buyers premium).

ALBINO IMPRESSION ON SG 53cb

An interesting fact emerged concerning lot 76 - the 'ourpence' omitted variety on one stamp in a block of six (SG 53+53cb) - on the Christie's Robson Lowe 19 November 1996 sale.

There is an albino impression clearly present of all the omitted letters. Holmes (page 89) states that the omitted letters were due to the type having fallen out. If that was the case there should be no albino impression.

An albino impression would indicate that either those letters had somehow failed to receive ink, or there was an intrusion between stamp and overprinting forme over the affected letters - probably some scrap of paper. However, it is not known how this intrusion could have remained unnoticed through several overprintings, including once on the pane with inverted overprint.

If the affected letters had worked loose and ended up retracted relative to the other letters, perhaps the method of inking (e.g. by a very smooth hard roller) was such that the difference was enough to prevent those letters receiving ink but left them close enough to the paper when overprinting to make an impression?

It would be interesting to find out if any of the other omitted letter varieties on this stamp show traces of an albino overprint.

My thanks to Dr Philip Kinns of Stanley Gibbons, London, who drew my attention to the albino impression.

1885-87 CAPE 1/2d OVERPRINT DOUBLE - BLACK AND RED?

The Spanish Auction House 'Afinsa' contained an intriguing item on their 19 November 1996 sale. Lot 106 was described as:

"1886-89 ½d Outstanding copy with double surcharge in black and red. Very rare. (Gibbons no 4b)"

This description is incorrect as SG 4b has both overprints in black. However, neither does it appear to be the only listed alternative - SG 1b - which has the overprints in black and lake. The illustration in the catalogue was in colour and even allowing for variation in the colour reproduction (which appears very good), one of the overprints appears very much like the 'red' of SG 1.




No double overprint is recorded with 'black' and 'red'. The only two-colour double overprint has one of the overprints in lake - a distinct colour closer to crimson than to red.

From the illustration, the overprints appear to be of the correct length and not obviously forged. Unfortunately, the watermark is unknown (SG 1b occurs on Crown CA paper while SG 4b is on Anchor watermarked paper), so it not possible to determine what colours the overprints should be.

We would be delighted to hear from anyone who can supply further information on this mystery stamp. Perhaps one of our members was the buyer?

MYSTERY CANCELLATION



Illustrated above (with background faded to show postmark) is another interesting item from the Christie's Robson Lowe sale of 19 November. Lot 97 was a Bechuanaland Protectorate cover described as follows:




If the cover (which does not appear to be 'philatelic') originated at Palapye Station, why did the Postmaster not use the datestamp to cancel all the stamps rather than just the corner of the envelope?

Perhaps the cover originated from some small sub-office of Palapye which for some reason had no datestamp at that time and it received the Palapye Station datestamp in transit? Unfortunately, any evidence of the cover's origin that may have been on the flap has been lost. Any other theories? The cover was unsold.





Andy Andersson and David Wall's 'News From Botswana' column in RP 42 (p965) listed the proposed stamp issues for 1996. Comparison with Philatelic Bureau brochures show there appear to have been a few changes:

I received no brochure for the proposed 'Centenary of Rodin' issue planned for 3 June. Was this set issued? Or was it dropped or postponed to make way for the (unscheduled?) 'Radio Communications Centenary' which is listed above as having been issued on the same date?

The 'Centenary of Modern Olympics' issue appears to have been postponed from the 1st to the 19th July. Likewise, the 'Worthy Causes' set from 23rd to 27th September. I have no confirmation if the issue dates actually matched those in the publicity brochures.

POSTAL RATES - BRITISH BECHUANALAND TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES 1893-5

Jim Catterall

In Runner Post No. 38 Frederick Lawrence raised the question of the $4\frac{1}{2}$ d letter rate to Europe. As in the case of the 1891-2 rates the problem is difficult to resolve due to the lack of official documentation. However, in RP 32 (p662) John Inglefield-Watson quoted from the Annual Colonial Report for British Bechuanaland for the year to 31 March 94 which states that the letter rate from B.B. to Foreign Countries during that year was (reduced to) $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. Unfortunately this does not give the precise date of change.

The latest cover franked at 5d, recorded by me, before the appearance of my first $4\frac{1}{2}$ d cover is 5 Nov 93. The earliest $4\frac{1}{2}$ d cover is 25 Dec 93.

It seems reasonable to conclude that the rate was reduced somewhere between those dates. If this was indeed the case the reason for later frankings at 5d is a mystery.

Covers to foreign countries from the Bechuanalands during this period are scarce and in the absence of official Post Office Notices further cover evidence would be welcome.


It appears from the wording of the Colonial Report for 1893-4 that the rate from the Protectorate to foreign countries was reduced to $4\frac{1}{2}$ d at the same time, however this is doubtful as the rate before the Report was $6\frac{1}{2}$ d and afterwards from an examination of known covers the rate was very soon $6\frac{1}{2}$ d again where it remained until 1 April 1899.

When the next Colonial Report (1894-5) appeared the table of rates was unchanged except that the reference to the Protectorate had disappeared. The conclusion must be that the reference to the Protectorate in the earlier report was a mistake.

By a curious coincidence in the CRL auction of Nov 19 1996 - Lot 57 - was a cover from Gaberones to France which was franked at $4\frac{1}{2}$ d and travelled without penalty!

The appropriate section of the 1893-4 Colonial Report for British Bechuanaland is illustrated.

BRITISH BECHUANA-LAND. 1893-4. Mail Services.

The mails have continued to be carried with fair regularity during the year, the only months during which delays of a serious nature occurred being November and December, when the exceptionally heavy rains caused the Rivers Maropong and Notwani to rise to an unprecedented height and to remain in flood for periods of from three to seven days. In February last, the severe storms prevalent throughout British Rechuanaland resulted in a considerable damage to the Railway between Warrenton and Taungs, where extensive washaways occurred, and for four days mail communication with the Cape Colony was entirely suspended from this cause.

The number and value of the different descriptions of mail matter posted within British Bechuanaland and the Protectorate during the year were as follows:—

THE BECHUANALAND CAMPAIGN OF 1896-97

The last issue of *The Runner Post* included the interesting article 'The Bechuanaland Campaign' (RP 44, pages 1052-1063) which comprising chapter 2 of *The Cape Town Highlanders* 1885-1970 by Neil Orpen.

The following pages contain illustrations of some military mail covers which emanated from that campaign.

Covers are far from common. In 15 years I have accumulated illustrations of seven covers and I know of one other. Further examples are bound to exist and I would be grateful if owners of unrecorded covers would send me photostats.




Figure 1 2 March 1897 cover to Scotland. Endorsed "On Active, Stamps unobtainable". KIMBERLEY (2 Mar) cds, London '2½" /F.B./A.' (British Foreign Branch) marking, 'T/25c' tax marking and manuscript 'T'. Backstamped CHARGE CLERK (Cape Town, 4 Mar) and Dunfermline (28 Mar) arrival cds. (MacGregor)




Figure 2 25 March 1897 cover to Scotland. Endorsed "On Active, Stamps unobtainable". VRYBURG (25 Mar) cds, London '2½D / F.B./C.' (British Foreign Branch), 'T/25c' & 'T' tax markings. Dunfermline (18 April) arrival backstamp.

Two covers (Figures 1 and 2) are addressed to members of the same family in Scotland, and were posted three weeks apart. They are apparently from the same, though unidentified writer.

Three of the other covers (Figures 4, 5 and 6) have also been sent to one address and at first glance are remarkably similar in appearance. All three were written by a Private Solomon of the Prince Alfred Guards and are addressed to his mother in London. Two of these bear the same date of posting (22 June). Transport difficulties may have resulted in a delay to the outgoing mail with the result that several mail bags may have been delivered to Kuruman on the same day and thus received the same datestamp.




Figure 3 23 April 1897 cover England. Endorsed "On Active Service Stamps not available". From "Geo.W. Ward. Lieut / C.M. Riflemen / B.F.Force / 21.4.97" (Cape Mounted Riflemen). VRYBURG/B.B. (23 April) datestamp. 'T' / '25c' tax marking. London '1.B./2½D' (Inland Branch). Marlborough (27 May) arrival backstamp. Enclosed letter is headed "Ryan's / near the Langeberg / via Kuruman / Bechuanaland" (Owner?)




Figure 4 22 June 1897 cover (illustration of part of cover) to England. Endorsed "On Active Service, From Pte. S.J. Solomon P.A. Guards" countersigned by Commanding Officer. KURUMAN/BECHUANALAND (22 June) c.d.s. London '2^D/ F.B./A' accountancy marking.




Figure 6 26 June 1897 cover to England. Endorsed "On Active Service, From Pte. S.J. Solomon P.A. Guards" countersigned by Commanding Officer. KURUMAN/BECHUANALAND (26 June) c.d.s. London 2^D/F.B./A marking. (MacGregor pricelist 1987)




Figure 7 20 July 1897 cover to the Cape Colony. Endorsed "On Active Service, C.M. Yardley [?], B.V.I., B.F.F." (Bechuanaland Volunteer Infantry, Bechuanaland Field Force). Embossed shield in blue of the Cape Police on flap. KURUMAN / BECHUANALAND (20 July) c.d.s. Uitenhage arrival (24 July). (Crocker & MacGregor pricelist 1983)

POSTAL MARKING OR TELEGRAPHIC MARKING?

John Inglefield-Watson

When the Warren Expedition ended in September 1885, the military telegraph line from Barkly West to Mafeking was handed over to the civil administration, and the section from Mafeking to Molepolole was dismantled. According to Colonial Reports - Annual' for British Bechuanaland, which also covered the Protectorate until 1895, construction of a new line from Mafeking to (Fort) Salisbury was begun by the British South Africa Company in 1888/89. By 1889/90 it had reached Palachwe (Palapye) and was being extended to Macloutsie and Fort Tuli. It was completed to Salisbury in 1891/92. As construction of the railway progressed, the line was transferred from the line of road to the line of rail, though the old line Serowe - Macloutsie - Tuli was also retained. The line was operated by the British South Africa Company and its successors until at least 1959 and perhaps later.

The telegraph facilities were, in most but not all cases, located at offices or agencies that also provided postal services. There were periods when the lists of Post Offices and Postal Agencies published in Cape and South African Post Office Guides and in The Bechuanaland Protectorate Telephone Directory did not include the Telegraph Offices and Agencies that had no postal facilities, these being in separate lists that I do not possess. It is therefore not possible for me to compile a complete list of such offices showing the years in which they opened, closed or were upgraded to Post Offices or Postal Agencies. Furthermore there are long periods for which I have no lists of any kind, especially between 1913 and 1921 and from 1923 to 1949. The best that I can do in many cases is to express dates on a 'before' and 'after' basis.

What is not in doubt is that in some cases cancellations exist that date from periods when the office concerned was listed as a Telegraph Office or Agency. In the absence of proving covers showing postal use, it would seem reasonable to assume that such cancellations are not postal markings but are on stamps removed from telegraph forms.

It has been suggested to me that at some offices providing both postal and telegraph services particular cancellers were specifically intended for telegraph use. Even if this can be confirmed, their occasional use for postal purposes cannot be ruled out.

The following Telegraph Offices are listed as being in existence by January 1904:

The information in this article is probably incomplete and certainly imprecise in respect of dates, especially in the above list of Telegraph Offices and Agencies that had no known postal facilities. A more complete and accurate list would be of great assistance in establishing the status of any cancellations from such offices. Can any member provide such a list or any other relevant information?

VARIATIONS FOUND WITHIN THE 1888 PROTECTORATE ½d VERMILION - DOUBLE OVERPRINT (SG 40a)

Steve Wallace

My previous article in RP 24 (p450-2), recorded quite a wide range of variations in the relative 'separation' and 'side-shift' between the double overprints. In an attempt to explain these variations, experiments have now been carried out as follows:

Transparencies were made of the overprint on a photocopy of a complete pane of SG 40, to enable the double overprint to be simulated by superimposing complete rows from upper and lower parts of the pane on the corresponding rows of the photocopy. In the rows selected, particularly from the lower part of the pane, the overprints were not horizontal throughout the row.

The transparency of each row being examined was placed in various vertical, horizontal or angled positions relative to the underlying overprint on the photocopy, and measurements were made of the separation and side-shift on each stamp in the row.

Findings.

The overprint was hand-set and this resulted in the individual impressions in complete panes of the stamps (SG 40) not being vertically aligned throughout each vertical strip. Divergence from the horizontal also occurred within rows of the setting.

When the second impression of the double overprint (SG 40a) was applied in complete alignment both horizontally and vertically with the first impression, a side-shift only occurred on those stamps whose overprint was not horizontal, and the separation was constant throughout the pane.

When the second impression was aligned horizontally but not vertically, there was a constant side-shift on stamps with horizontal overprints, and two different side-shifts on those not horizontal.

When the second impression was not aligned horizontally with the first impression, i.e. applied at a slightly different angle, this further affected the side-shift, and resulted in significantly different separations at opposite extremes of a row. (Less so if pivoted around the centre of a row).

It therefore seems possible that the different side-shifts and separations recorded in each of the 'Close Together' and 'Widely Separated' groups of double overprints recorded in RP 24 could have occurred within a very small number of panes, or even a single pane of each group.

THE RUNNER POST ISSUE 45 DECEMBER 1996

THOSE B****Y RATES AGAIN

Alan Drysdall and Jim Catterall




Figure 1 The Sitwell cover posted at Mafeking on the 6th May, 1891

Since the articles on the Sitwell correspondence were published¹, two more covers have been reported. The earlier of the two (Fig. 1) is particularly important as it provides critical evidence regarding postage rates in May 1891. The later cover is of interest only in so far as it is one of only two known that are not addressed to Barmoor. Who the addressee, Miss Strong, was, is not known.

The earlier cover is annotated '1st May 1891' and the franking, a 4d stamp, is cancelled with the barred-oval canceller (BONC) coded '638' issued to Mafeking. A strike of a single-circle datestamp on the reverse records the letter was posted there on the 6th May, 1891. Sitwell's whereabouts at this time are not known with any certainty, but as he was seconded to the BBP with effect from the 20th March, 1891, he is unlikely to have travelled further north than British Bechuanaland by the 1st May (i.e. within six weeks). He was in any case in no great hurry to proceed northwards from Mafeking as he must have done the survey work for his map of the route from Mafeking to Gaberones, which is dated 1891, at this time. The annotation on the cover may record that the letter it contained was written five days before it was posted, in which case Sitwell may have been some distance north of Mafeking and gave the letter to a passing traveller to post for him. This, however, is speculation, as Sitwell commonly sent more than one letter in an envelope annotated with the date of the earliest. He may in any case have had no option but to post the letter at Mafeking, as the only office between Mafeking and Palachwe that might have been open at this time was Gaberones. However, although Holmes' records that this office opened in December 1890, Putzel' quotes the relevant date as the 1st July, 1893. (The earliest reported strike of the datestamp the 14th October, 1892').

However, whether or not Sitwell himself posted the letter in Mafeking is irrelevant as far as the postage rate was concerned. There is no evidence that the addressee was charged deficient postage and this cover therefore provides evidence that in May 1891 the British Bechuanaland rate for a half-ounce letter addressed to the UK was 4d. Moreover the cover passed unremarked through Cape Town, and this office was therefore presumably aware that this was the applicable rate.

Mail originating from Mashonaland proves that the Protectorate rate for a half-ounce letter addressed to the UK was reduced from 8d to 6d sometime between the 23rd January and the 20th February, 1891. There would now seem to be a distinct possibility that the British Bechuanaland rate was reduced from 6d to 4d at the same time. The evidence in the form of covers posted in British Bechuanaland and addressed to the UK, of which there are comparatively few (see Table 1), is, however, conflicting. For example, it would seem that the letters posted in June and September 1891 were mistakenly franked at the old rate of 6d per half ounce if the Sitwell cover described above is accepted as evidence that the reduced rate was in force by early May.

Further evidence is provided by covers addressed to Germany (Table 2). In this case the equivalent reduction in the rate was from $7\frac{1}{2}$ d to 5d. There is, however, an additional complication in that payment of the higher rate was commonly receipted with stamps to the value of 8d, presumably because there was a chronic shortage of halfpenny stamps. In this case the frankings are consistent with a change in the rate sometime between the 23rd January and the 20th February, 1891, except that a letter franked at the '8d rate' was posted on the 5th September, only three days after a similarly addressed cover posted at Vryburg rather than Mafeking, was accepted at the reduced rate.

the franking was affixed after the Macloutsie datestamp was struck, and was cancelled with the barred-oval mark coded '555' at Vryburg tovers addressed to Mrs Goldney, Camberley, Surrey, Miss Strong, Co. Down




Figure 2 A cover posted in East London on the 13th May, 1892, addressed to Lance-Corporal W.A. Atkinson with the BBP at Macloutsie (Courtesy of John Taylor)

There are far fewer examples of incoming mail, and no covers addressed to Sitwell are known. The cover illustrated as Figure 2 is addressed Lance-Corporal W.A. Atkinson of 'G' Troop, BBP, Macloutsie, and was posted in East London on the 13th May, 1892. The backstamps record a route *via* Midland T.P.O. Up ('MY 14 / 92') to Vryburg ('B / MY 15 / 92') and Mafeking ('A / MY 17 / 92') and receipt in Macloutsie on 'MY 22 / 92' (a Sunday). An annotation in manuscript records that the addressee answered the letter two days later, a date on which mail is known to have been despatched from Macloutsie (see Table 3).




Figure 3 A cover, posted in East London on the 12th October, 1893, addressed to Atkinson at Fort Gaberones. The backstamps are: Midland Up 'AU 13 / 93', Kimberley 'AP 14 / 93', Vryburg 'AP (1)5 / 93' and Mafeking 'AP 17 / 93'. The sender recorded his name and address as 'J. Doherty, Tres [Treasury] Department, East London

At least four other covers addressed to Atkinson are known. All are in the same handwriting, were posted in Cape Colony and such backstamps that have been reported show that they were forwarded via the same route. The covers posted on the 13th December, 1891⁵, 22nd April, 1892⁶, and 13th May, 1892 (Fig. 2), are addressed to Macloutsie, 'British Bechuanaland', but two later covers posted in October 1892⁷ and April 1893 (Fig. 3), are addressed to Fort Gaberones, 'Southern Protectorate'. The frankings record that the sender paid 2d, the Cape rate for a half-ounce letter addressed to British Bechuanaland. The evidence relating to Mashonaland mail in April-May 1892 proves that the Protectorate surcharge of 2d per half ounce on incoming letter mail which had to be paid by the addressee - applied at this time. It is also known that even when the surcharge was paid - as is recorded in Andrew Puzey's correspondence - the mail was neither handstamped nor annotated to receipt payment⁸. The cover received in Gaberones on the 14th October, 1892, is therefore unusual in that it is annotated in manuscript with what appears to be a large figure '2' to record that the addressee was to be charged 2d. The cover illustrated as Figure 3, however, is annotated with a '4' in blue crayon. This charge must relate to underpaid postage, as according to the Postal Notice published on the 18th November, 1892, the Protectorate surcharge was dropped with effect from that date. However, although the surcharge was dropped, the half ounce letter rate from Cape Colony to the Protectorate was increased to 4d. The sender of this letter having prepaid only the former 2d rate, the addressee was charged double the deficiency, i.e. 2 x 2d = 4d.

THE OVERPRINTED 1/2d BRITISH NEWSPAPER WRAPPER

Peter Thy and John Inglefield-Watson

Newspaper wrappers were introduced in British Bechuanaland during January 1887 to pay the ½d local and the Id United Kingdom rates. Both Cape of Good Hope and Great Britain wrappers were overprinted. The last of these was issued in 1889-90 and their usage appears to have been discontinued as the stock was exhausted.

One of the most common British Bechuanaland postal stationery items is the overprinted ½d Great Britain newspaper wrapper. The wrapper was both printed and overprinted by De La Rue and Co. Two different types of wrappers were overprinted. The first wrapper from 1883 has five lines of instructions and was released in Bechuanaland during October 1888; the second wrapper from 1889 has four lines of instructions and was according to Holmes released in Bechuanaland later the same year. The De La Rue Day Books, now at the National Postal Museum in London, show that three printings were made of the ½d wrappers totalling 143,040 copies, but do not specify which overprinting was made on which type of wrapper.

De La Rue did the first overprinting during September 1887 (32,640 copies), the second overprinting in May 1890 (14,400 copies), and the third and final overprinting (96,000 copies) in November 1891. Since the four-line wrapper was introduced in Great Britain on September 1, 1889,³ only the second and third overprinting can possibly have been made on this design.

There are some additional and interesting details in the Day Books. The first two overprintings were packed, insured, and shipped by De La Rue apparently direct to Bechuanaland. This contrasts with the normal procedure that required the printer to deliver the finished product to the Inland Revenue Stamping Department.⁴ Another interesting detail is that for the second (May 1890) overprinting, the Stamping Department was invoiced for both printing and overprinting. The latter was not the case for the first overprinting and for another shipment not involving newspaper wrappers for which the Day Book also details the content of the invoice. This suggests that the Stamping Department in May 1890 did not have a stock of wrappers to forward with the warrant to the printer for overprinting. The May 1890 overprinting, therefore, may have been made on a special printing or as part of a larger Great Britain printing.

In October 1890, the current British Bechuanaland postal stationery and stamps were distributed by U.P.U.'s International Bureau in Berne to member countries.^{5,6} This was the result of a July 1889 agreement to exchange specimen copies between members and some British controlled protectorates not yet U.P.U. members. The ½d wrapper distributed, together with the 1d wrapper, was the one with the four lines of instructions. The shipment of the 345 U.P.U. wrappers must have occurred in early 1890 and, therefore, suggests that the second overprinting must have been made on the four-line wrapper. The specimen canceller applied to the wrappers was of a type believed to have been used locally in Bechuanaland.⁶ Consequently, the wrappers must have been shipped to southern Africa and then back to Europe again, a journey that took the best part of two months.

It can confidently be assumed that the first overprinting was made on the wrapper with the five lines of instructions because this was the first type issued. Thus, it would now make sense to suggest that both the second and third overprintings were done on the four-line wrapper since this design replaced the British wrappers in 1889.

In order to evaluate this possibility, we have examined our admittedly limited holding of the 1888 ½ wrapper (the one with the five explanatory lines of text). Clearly, there exist two overprint types identified by the cancelling bars (see illustration). One type has the bars terminated parallel to the text lines. The other has the bars terminated perpendicular to the length of the bars (squared). In addition, a 180° rotation will produce a close (but not perfect) overlap of the two asymmetrical and marginal bars. This may imply two different overprintings on the five-line wrapper.

Could it be that the third overprinting was also done on the five-line wrapper since two subtypes (printings?) exist of this type? The relative scarcity of the two types of overprinted wrappers prove that this is not so. We have pooled our, again very limited, holdings of these wrappers and the result is 12 copies of the wrapper with five text lines and 12 copies of the wrapper with four text lines. Although hardly a statistically sound sample, it is still sufficient to conclude that there must have existed more than the 14,400 copies of four-line wrapper produced by the second overprinting (minus 340 copies U.P.U. specimen cancelled). On this background, it is plausible that both the second and third overprintings were made on the four-lined wrapper.

Finally, how do the two types of overprint on the five-line wrapper fit into the printing information? If we accept the above argument, we know that there was only one printing of this type of wrapper and both bar types must have been produced as part of the same overprinting. Our combined holdings suggests that the subtype with the squared terminated bars is the most common (9 copies), while the subtype with the parallel terminated bars are less common (3 copies). The subtype with the squared bars is known cancelled AU 30 1890.

From the above arguments, we can conclude that only one printing of a total of 32,640 copies was made of the five-lined wrapper, while two printings were made on the four-lined wrapper totalling 110,400. The first of the latter two overprintings were specimen overprinted and distributed by U.P.U. in 1890, and cannot have been issued in the British Bechuanaland prior to that date as suggested by Holmes.¹

We would greatly appreciate hearing any comments as to the relative scarcity of the various ½d wrappers and information on dated examples in particular prior to November 1891.



RULES OF THE BECHUANALANDS AND BOTSWANA SOCIETY (Rev 96)

- 1. The TITLE of the Society shall be 'THE BECHUANALANDS AND BOTSWANA SOCIETY'
- The OBJECT of the Society shall be to encourage study of all aspects of the Philately and Postal History of these territories
- 3. The Hon. Secretary may (at his/her discretion) admit to membership an applicant on payment of the Annual Subscription at any time in force and thereafter payable on 1st day of July each year. Any member who has not paid his/her subscription by 1st October shall be deemed to have had the benefits of membership suspended until such time as payment has been made. If no payment is received within a further three months the member shall automatically be deemed to have resigned.

(Amendment approved at AGM on 13 October 1993)

- 4. The Annual Subscription shall be reviewed annually by the Committee, any increase in the Subscription to be notified to all members and to be endorsed at the next Annual General meeting of the Society before being implemented.
- 5. A General Meeting of the Society shall be held annually at the Autumn meeting of the Society. It will normally be held in October on a date to be determined by the Committee. The Annual General Meeting shall:
 - (a) Receive the Reports of the Officers for the preceding year:
 - (b) Review and approve as necessary the Statement of Accounts presented by the Hon. Treasurer and shall appoint an Hon. Auditor for the ensuing year.
 - (c) In alternate years, commencing in October 1990, elect the Officers of the Society and other Committee Members to serve for the ensuing two-year period.
 - (d) Determine the rate of the Annual Subscription for the ensuing year.
 - (e) Consider any other business resolutions or matters arising, subject to Rule 16
- 6. The OFFICERS of the Society, who shall be Honorary, will comprise:

Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Editor, Auctioneer, Archivist

and any others it is deemed necessary to appoint from time to time.

These OFFICERS shall constitute the Committee of the Society and shall be empowered to co-opt other Members to the Committee as necessary. They shall be elected biennially at a General Meeting of the Society, where any postal votes previously received from Members unable to attend in person shall be deemed valid.

The CHAIRMAN shall serve for a maximum period of two consecutive two-year terms before standing down for at least one term of office. However, after serving the maximum period, the ex-Chairman shall become eligible to serve on the Committee in any other capacity.

(Amendment approved 19 September 1996)

7. The Chairman or, in his/her absence, the Vice-Chairman, shall conduct the Meetings, but in the event that both are absent the Committee shall elect one of its number to take the Chair. The Chairman of the meeting shall have a second or casting vote where this is necessary.

(Amendment approved 19 September 1996)

8. The Hon. Secretary shall conduct the Correspondence of the Society, keep a Register of Members and maintain a Minute Book. The latter shall be available for reference at General Meetings.

- 9. The Hon. Treasurer shall have charge of the Funds of the Society, and maintain a Bank Account in the name of the Society, depositing therein Annual Subscriptions and other income, and paying thereout all sums validly due. He/she shall present to the Annual General Meeting of the Society a Statement of the Society's Accounts, duly audited, for the twelve-month period ended on the preceding 30th June.
- 10. An Honorary Auditor shall be appointed.
- 11. An Auctioneer shall, under the direction of the Committee, organise and control Auctions or Exchange Packets, whether postal or otherwise, on behalf of the Society. The Committee shall have power to make and vary Rules necessary for these purposes which will then be deemed to be a part of the Society's Rules.
- 12. The Editor will be responsible for production of the Society newsletter entitled 'THE RUNNER POST', and such other publications as the Society may decide to issue from time to time.
- 13. An archivist or other appointed Officer or Member shall retain for reference purposes at least one copy of every publication of the Society, together with similar material acquired by the Society in connection with its objects.
- 14. Honorary Life Membership may be awarded to any member of the Society who is deemed to have made an outstanding contribution, over a long period, to the well-being of the Society. All nominations are to be submitted to the Hon. Secretary in writing, signed by a proposer and seconder, for consideration by the Committee. The Committee will be wholly responsible for establishing and maintaining appropriately high standards for the award and for deciding, by a majority of at least three-quarters of the Committee Members voting, upon the merits of the nomination. The Committee will submit each successful nomination for final approval at a general meeting of the Society.

(Amendment approved at AGM on 5 October 1991)

- 15. That if in the considered view of the Committee it shall be in the best interest of the Society that a Member shall be removed from Membership, then his/her Membership be terminated forthwith.
- 16. That all Resolutions should be notified to the Hon. Secretary in sufficient time for their inclusion in the Agenda of an Annual General Meeting, and that any other items should be notified to the Chairman before the start of the meeting: the Chairman to rule whether the item is of sufficient urgency to be included on the Agenda.
- 17. The Committee shall be the sole authority for interpretation of these Rules and shall decide on all relevant matters affecting the Society not provided for within them.
